GENERAL RULES & REGULATIONS

BE SURE TO READ RULES & REGULATIONS AT BEGINNING OF EACH SECTION.

- 1. Syndicates, groups or partnerships will be respected as separate, individual exhibitors.
- 2. Tickets must be attached to each article for exhibition and reclaimed by persons who have entered.
- 3. All items (entry fees) subject to payment of G.S.T. and P.S.T. regulations will be enacted by H.A.S. All entry fees collected will be paid out as prize money to exhibitors.
- 4. All competitors are subject to the Society's General Rules & Regulations and when doubts or disputes arise, the Board of Directors shall decide the same.
- 5. All judges have been carefully selected and persons making entries accept these judges and agree to abide by their decisions. The judge has the privilege of withholding a first prize in any class where he/she feels there is no article qualified to receive a first prize. Protests or other grounds must be made in writing on the day in which protested action was taken, given to the chairperson of the department and accompanied by a non-refundable cash deposit of \$50.00.
- 6. The Society will take reasonable precaution to ensure the safety of all exhibits on exhibition, but the owners themselves must take the risk of exhibiting them. Exhibitors must supply their own hay, bedding or grain. All exhibitors must be responsible for their own exhibits.
- 7. The Directors reserve the right to pay prizes according to the money available. Specials are in addition to prize money.
- 8. There will be absolutely no replacement of voided cheques. All cheques must be cashed within 30 days of issuance. This rule will be strictly adhered to. All prize money will be paid in Canadian Funds.
- 9. No animal having a contagious disease shall be allowed on the exhibition grounds, and if any animal has been admitted through an oversight, and is suffering from any such disease, the executive committee shall immediately order its removal from the grounds and cause the stall to be disinfected.
- 10. **SMOKING IS ABSOLUTELY FORBIDDEN IN ALL BUILDINGS** and it is forbidden to connect heaters, floodlights, etc. to the electric circuits in the barns.
- 11. No dog or other vicious animal will be allowed on the grounds unless forming part of an entertainment group and is under the constant care of its keeper.
- 12. The Directors reserve the right to amend or change these rules in any way they see fit.
- 13. The Society will not hold itself responsible for any grammatical, typographical or printing errors in the prize list. Should they occur, the Directors shall rule on them.

HORSE SHOW REGULATIONS

- 1. All exhibitors must wear proper riding attire.
- 2. Junior riders (under 18 years) **at all times**, must wear a helmet with a permanent chinstrap secured when competing.
- 3. A pony is classified as 14.2 hands or under, a horse is 14.2 hands or higher.
- 4. An Exhibitor's Pass will be given to an exhibitor who has paid a minimum of \$12.00 of entry fees before Wednesday, August 9, 2023 at 5:00 p.m. There will be NO reimbursement of gate admission for entries made on the day of the show. All grooms and support staff will be required to pay admission at the gate. If you register at the office before August 9, you will be eligible to exchange your exhibitors pass for a week-end pass (includes rides) after you have shown your horse or pony.
- 5. This horse show is intended for every participant to have fun.
- 6. No interference with, or complaints to judges by an exhibitor will be tolerated. Formal objections must be made in writing on the day in which protested action was taken to the show committee accompanied by a non-refundable cash deposit of \$50.00.
- 7. All entries must be made at the Huntingdon Fairgrounds (1565 <u>Fairview Road</u>) <u>before August 9th to receive an entry pass. Entries may be made the day of the show but there will No Reimbursement of Gate Admission.</u>
- 8. **ENTRY FEES**: \$3.00 per class **OR** \$30.00 per rider.

DAIRY CATTLE RULES

***Rules given by Agri-Traçabilité Québec Inc.

- 1. Syndicates, groups or partnerships will be respected as separate, individual exhibitors.
- 2. Entry Fee: A 20 % entry fee will be deducted from prize money for classes 1-8. 30% of prize money on late entries for classes 1-8.
- 3. 1 Exhibitor Pass per head (maximum 4) will be given to each exhibitor, additional passes may be purchased. This pass does not include access to the rides.
- 4. Cattle classes will be shown as scheduled and exhibitors are requested to have their cattle on the grounds by Friday, August 11th at 6:00 pm.
- 5. All animals must be registered at time of making entries. The name, registration number, date of birth (year/month/day), name and registration number of sire and dam are also required. B.C.A. is not required but will be used in the program.
- 6. All exhibits must be registered in the name of the exhibitor in accordance with the by-law of their respective association. The certificate of registration must state that the animal is purebred or at least 75% of purebred inheritance. All exhibits must be legibly tattooed (if applicable).
- 7. The maximum total eligible exhibit from a breeding unit is 15 head
- 8. **HEALTH REGULATIONS**: All animals offered for entry must be free from contact with any contagious or infectious disease for a period of 60 days prior to the opening of the Fair.
- 9. ENTRIES CLOSE FRIDAY, AUGUST 4TH AT 5:00 p.m. Entries after this date will be accepted only if space available.
- 10. Verification of animals will take place Friday August 11th between 6:00 p.m. and 9:00 p.m. All exhibitors are asked to have someone present with their animals with registration certificates and production certificates during this time.
- 11. **Animals may leave on Saturday at 18h00.** HAS offers \$10/head, maximum \$50/exhibitor who stays until 15h00 on Sunday.
- **In virtue of Federal and Provincial cattle identification rules, animals without electronic identification will not be accepted on site.
